Attorney Brian Akashian is here tonight, the law associate of Mr. Murphy. Everybody knows that Mr. Murphy is general counsel of Lowell Housing Authority, and we welcome Attorney Akashian.

Before getting started on any item, including Item Number 1, I just want, for the record, to indicate that the Lowell Housing Authority community has lost one of its strong soldiers, Donny McGillicuddy. And with that being the case I'd just like to have a moment of silence in memory of Donny McGillicuddy.

Thank you.

I'll have something more to say about Donny at the appropriate time later on in the agenda.

The first item on the agenda is the approval of the minutes of the Lowell Housing Authority meeting that was held on February 14th, 2024.

Item Number 4 is 13 Mr. Shea: 14 subcommittee reports. Any subcommittee reporting 15 today? 16 Mr. Chhan: There's none. 17 Mr. Shea: Thank you. Next item is Okay. 18 Item Number 5, the finance and audit report. And our 19 chief financial officer, Sherry Giblin, will express 20 to us publicly the details of that report. Mrs. 21 Giblin. 22 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Ms. Giblin: The Authority's operating statement for the 23 24 period ending January 31st, 2024 were provided to the Board for their review. Our four federal AMPs remain revenue producing; however, there was a decrease in operating gains of \$100,000 in January. This is mainly due to the decrease in operating subsidiary.

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Rent across all four AMPs remain over budget. Subsidiary is under budget through January. As previously reported, operating fund proration decreased to 87 percent in January. This proration is based on the lowest of the current congressional 2024 budget proposals.

Expenses across all AMPs are within budget tolerance through January, with most expenses well below budgeted estimates. This is not indicative of true savings, but timing issues of larger contracts, utilities, quarterly obligations, and year-end activity.

Utilities remain under budget at the end of January. Our maintenance lines are under budget in all categories across all major programs except for AMP 3. AMP 3 is realizing budget overruns in maintenance labor and contracts.

Insurance and benefits are within budget tolerance. Our general expense category is also under budget across all AMPs due to collection loss

deferral until year end.

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The 667-2B Concord River Mill Program is revenue producing to date. Rent remains slightly over budget; however, subsidies are under budget due to vacancies that have now been leased up. Mass Housing has approved a contract rent increase for this development effective February 1st, 2024.

Our state consolidated program is realizing a net loss through January. This loss is entirely due to OPEB expenses that are not budgeted per state quidelines.

Our central office program is realizing a net loss through January. Management fees are in line with budget estimates. Other income is under budget in skilled labor billing due to a vacant position that has been filled.

Admin costs and insurance benefits are within budget tolerance. Our maintenance line item remains under budget.

Our Section 8 program is operating above budget estimates. Admin fees are slightly over budget. Admin expenses are under budget through January. Insurance and benefits are within budget. And our other general expense category is over budget

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At this time I'd open it up to any questions from the Board.

Mr. Shea: Thank you for those remarks. Any question to our chief financial officer? I guess not. With that being the case, Commissioner Rodney Elliott makes the motion to accept the report, seconded by Commissioner Joanie Bernes. The clerk will call the roll.

Mr. Shea: Next item is the report of the Chair. And I'd like to take an opportunity just to say a few words for the record.

Since this is my last meeting as the

chairman of the Board of Commissioners I just want to

put into the record a couple items that I thought may be worthwhile to reflect on in the future. And there's a lot I could say, but, you know, usually when I say I'm going to speak for 5 minutes it goes for 15, so I'll just try to cut this short.

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I see Sherry just smiled and Tha's in agreement. The bottom line is yeah, I just want to make some comments about being together with my colleagues up here, with the Board of Commissioners, because I think it's proper to reflect on some of the items that have taken place probably in the last 20 or 30 months. Particularly the last 12, 13 months. And so believe it or not, I actually sat down, I had to write some notes for myself. There's so much I could talk about that I'm going to limit myself to just a few areas. And as the record indicates, this is my third year as being the chairman of the board. Prior to that Commissioner McMann was the chairman and prior to that I think it was Commissioner Howard.

And so it's just, in my point of view, and once again this is just my point of view, and I could be totally wrong or maybe half right, but I do want to express what I think. I think there's been a lot accomplished here with the Board of Commissioners,

and particularly in the last 15, 16 months.

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Particularly 13 months ago with the election of the new director to bring us in a new direction. And when I think about when I first came on the Board, the first year and the second year, then I got more involved with the finance committee and I got more involved in the Authority, it just seemed to me that if you stopped and think about — just privately, you stopped and think about where we were two or three years ago and where we are today, I think it's a revamping of the Lowell Housing Authority both in the union as well as the nonunion staff. And I think it's all been heading in the right direction.

You know, if you take a look at what the finance committee recommended when it comes to how we treat our employees financially, I think there's been a remarkable improvement because we basically fall back on what we call the degree of responsibility. I think we now pay our employees probably a living wage that is based on the degree of responsibility. It's not based on a personalty. It's based on the job that you have to do. And in my point of view, working with Commissioner Mony Var and the finance committee, I think that we've been able to indicate

to the employees in a monetary way our appreciation for their efforts. Because I had a feeling two or three years ago that that may not be the way that some people looked at things.

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However, when you stop and think about where we were with the union, for instance, in the last three years this Board of Commissioners, under the direction of -- particularly the last year and a half under the direction of Tha Chhan, we've given the Board of Commissioners just a decent pay raise that accumulates to probably 13 and a half percent. let me assure you, that's a heck of a lot better than the past history. And I do think that when you see the content that there is in the union, and I checked the record as recent as three days ago, the union has not filed a grievance against the Board in the last two and a half years. I won't go into what happened prior to that. But there was a change in the direction of the union, there was a change in the direction of the Board of Commissioners with respect to paying our employees a decent wage. And you take that into consideration, that's a plus. And it's been driven home particularly by Tha Chhan who, as the head of the administration office -- admission

office, I should say, which is now in the capable hands of our new head, Alisen Purtell, he would come into a meeting with us at the finance meeting and say here are the salaries I'd like for my employees. And I think history would prove, he won every battle. And that's because he wanted to pay the employees along the lines of the degree of responsibility.

And so I think that this Board has set the record straight with respect to their point of view on how we treat our employees. And I do think we treat our men better, and I think we're treating our women a heck of a lot better. And I don't want to go too far into that.

But I do think the record ought to indicate that, and it's nothing to do with any individual, a member of the Board of Commissioners, it has to do with the full Board. Everything that has been recommended by the finance committee under Commissioner Mony Var has to be voted on by the Board.

And so with that being the case, I think leaving as chairman I can leave saying in my -- being self-serving maybe, I can say I did the best I could to be helpful in trying to stabilize the Lowell

Housing Authority. And I notice there's a couple property managers here tonight. And three years ago I made a statement that the most valuable employee to the Lowell Housing Authority are the property managers. If you don't have good property managers out there protecting our 1,800 units and 5,000 residents, you don't have a shot of succeeding. We have great property managers and we remunerated them on a degree of responsibility. So I'm glad to be a participant in that conclusion.

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I'll just close by saying that -- I think I may have mentioned it earlier, but sometimes I repeat I grew up across the street in the North myself. I played at O'Brien Terrace Common Village. football. I swam in the swimming pool at the North Common. I am so proud of being a resident of the Acre and growing up in public housing. I am really proud of that. . My mother with my three brothers, after my father got killed. And to be the commissioner of the Lowell Housing Authority is a tremendous accomplishment, that I look at it that way. A tremendous accomplishment. And I thank the city manager for appointing me and reappointing me. And I thank the -- I guess the employees for putting

up with me. But to be the chairman of the Lowell

Housing Authority when seven years ago I shined shoes

down the street for 10 cents a shine. That's a

tremendous accomplishment, if I have to say so.

And so with that being the case, those are the report of the chair, and those are the report of chairman as he concludes his term as chairman of the Board of Commissioners.

With that, on behalf of the residents of the Lowell Housing Authority, on behalf of the program participant and the Lowell Housing Authority staff, I'd like to thank you for your strong commitment and dedication through all these years.

Today it is with great pleasure that I present to you the annual report of the Lowell Housing Authority, 26 pages that I think is in front of you right now.

Without getting into the specific detail of the report, I just want to highlight the challenges and the accomplishment of the Housing Authority throughout fiscal year 2023/2024. But another important component that I want to highlight is the

outstanding performance of the Lowell Housing
Authority team that comprise the Housing Authority
staff and maintenance staff, and including general
counsel team that Brian Akashian and Attorney Kevin
Murphy, and my esteemed colleague that's sitting
right next to me here and behind me, everyone here,
thank you.

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Housing Authority would not have been able to accomplish such goal without their hard work, without their persistent effort, coming into work each and every day responding to the need of our residents. With that I would like to thank the entire Lowell Housing Authority team for the commitment and the dedication, and also congratulate for the job well done. Thank you guys. Thank you. Good job. (Applause.)

Now, I'm going to probably be really brief because of time. In this fiscal year 2024/2025 promise another exciting year for our team, of course. We hold great hope and optimism, and looking forward to the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

Mr. Chairman and commissioners, rest assured that our team will remain focused on our mission to

provide quality of life for our residents. And as always, we look forward to your leadership, your direction, your guidance and support. And we'll continue to carry the Board mandate set forth in our strategic plan and approved by the Board.

18 one, it's been a couple years now, and once again,

19 | some money -- I see Laura here, did you want to make

20 remarks for the record?

Like this is the first step of many steps, I

22 guess we can say. Thank you, Laura.

23 Ms. Watts: You're welcome. Good evening.

24 Yeah, so we were honored by the City of Lowell

Community Preservation by -- with this \$150,000 grant to be used towards the Hadley House. You mentioned this is the first step, we are still hoping to come with DCR on terms for the land that the house sits on. So we're kind of at a standstill until that happens, but we have these funds to help us move forward once it does.

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Mr. Shea: I know Attorney Murphy was working with the state on trying to get this resolved with respect to what the value was on the land. I was just wondering, Tha, do you have any update on that? Maybe Attorney --

Mr. Chhan: It is still pending. We're waiting for the -- of course the team engage, the team discussion. The process of buying the land is still there, has not been completed yet. So we are still waiting at this point.

Ms. Watts: Yeah, essentially the ball is in DCR's court.

Mr. Shea: Right. I know that he gave us a report not long ago indicating that there is some back and forth with respect to what's the value, but okay. We'll gather some more information. But the 150,000, that comes -- that's held as a credit. Is

there any termination date for that?

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Ms. Watts: Not that I'm aware of. No

Mr. Shea: It's funny, I'm the housing representative of the city. I got appointed by Director Wallace, and I'm on that committee. But when we vote on that -- when we have the public hearings we vote, then we take everything and it goes to the city council. And then they make a decision as to what they want to give us, and then it goes to the manager. It's kind of -- it's a winding road.

But anyhow, I just want to say for the record, I want to thank you for your effort because you've been on this since day one. And it's a challenging project, those four units -- four, five units for our veterans. It's a very challenging project and it's going to be a very costly project. But I want to thank you for your tenacity in following up with what's going on out there.

Ms. Watts: Thank you. It's an exciting project. I'm happy to be a part of it and look forward to moving it forward.

designer on this is the Waterfield Design Group.

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They did the front courtyard here and the exterior improvement. They also recently did the new egress over at the garage on Moody Street. And luckily Belko won the bid, so this is a winning team that we've had lots of success with on other projects.

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Mr. Shea: Have you done -- have they done work for us before?

Ms. Watts: Yes, they have. Yes, Belko did the -- did the site work here at the Mercier Center, and they did the new egress entry to the garage over at City View Tower. So this will be our third project with Belko and Waterfield Design Group as a team.

Mr. Shea: Okay. Well, that speaks for itself.

Ms. Watts: Thank you.

Mr. Shea: Your recommendation speaks for itself.

Mr. Shea: Next item is Item Number 7.1.4, motion to approve contract award for North Common Village boiler replacement to Performance Plumbing and Heating in the amount of \$608,824.

Mr. Goldfield: It's our project, so we delegated.

So good evening, thank you. Jonathan Goldfield. So this is the project that is being funded for the most part by the CBG funds from the city. So we had -- normally when we do a project like this we start two years ahead of time, it goes into the budget, we get a design team together, we go through that whole project. This was accelerated into just a few months. And every 15 minutes the

Executive Director would ask me are we a hundred percent sure we're going to pull this off? And every time he asked me I'd say I'm 98 percent sure, because you never know if you're going to have another flood. We didn't. So we got -- we went out, we secured a designer, Steve Crowley. We had a number of walk-throughs over at our boiler building at 361 Adams Street. And ultimately went out to bid, got four strong bids in that you -- I believe you have that in your packet. That's the low bidder, eligible responsible low bidder, this RO, \$608,824. And that includes everything that we wanted to include.

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We added a fourth water heater. Originally -- so we're somewhere in the 10,500,000 BTU range. It's a very large project. This is all the domestic hot water for all 506 apartments at the North Common Village. So we're very excited about it. We got good references on the plumbing company, Performance Plumbing and Heating. They were at the bid opening so we had a chance -- the CFO, Sherry Giblin and myself, and Rita had an opportunity to ask questions of the general contractor who was winning this bid. The engineer, Steve Crowley, made sure that they understood the scope of the project. And they

understood that the guideline -- the timeline is very quick. The city needs to spend this money before the summer, and we have every belief that we'll be able to make this happen. And we have the funds, we're ready to go. The notice to proceed will go out as soon as we have the contract in hand. And we're very grateful for this project, for the city for giving us this money. It's the first time, I believe, since I've been here anyway, that we got CBG funds. Which is also HUD funding, but a different pot. And the fact that we are public housing, low income, just puts a feather in the city's cap as well, as the money's being dedicated to that type of project because that's what CBG is for as well.

So we're very happy for this project.

Mr. Shea: Sherry, can you tell us what funding we have available for this particular project?

Ms. Giblin: As Jonathan noted, it's coming from the City of Lowell. A grant from the City of Lowell. It's a HUD grant that flows through the city to us.

Mr. Shea: We get a credit.

Ms. Giblin: Well, so this one is a little

1 different. We will never see this money. We will

- 2 | just take our invoices and submit them to the city.
- 3 The city will pay all the invoices on our behalf.
- 4 Nothing goes through our bank account.
 - Mr. Shea: Okay. Nothing -- okay.
- 6 Ms. Giblin: So the city holds all the
- funding. We submit everything to the city. They
- 8 | will pay everything on our behalf.
- 9 Mr. Shea: I know last week when I talked to
- 10 Tha about this we were waiting to see what the bid
- 11 | would be. We didn't know about the availability of
- 12 the money. And apparently from what it looks like,
- 13 this is kind of a favorable number.
- 14 Mr. Goldfield: Oh, very. Yeah.
- 15 Ms. Giblin: Yeah.
- 16 Mr. Goldfield: I can break it down for you
- 17 a little bit more if you'd like. The original grant
- 18 from the city is \$550,000. We allocated 200 of our
- 19 own capital funding in case. We may be able to get a
- 20 | little bit more. We'll see. That's been discussed
- 21 as well.
- 22 Mr. Shea: Can you tell us, for the record,
- 23 when you expect to get started?
- 24 Mr. Goldfield: Sure.

Mr. Shea: It's a massive production.

Mr. Goldfield: Yeah. Yeah, in April.

Mr. Shea: And when they expect to finish?

Mr. Goldfield: We should be finished by

June. Again, we expect to start in April.

Mr. Shea: Really?

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Mr. Goldfield: Yeah, really. We spoke with the plumbing contractor -- I always understood that the lead time for this type of equipment was pretty quick. When I talked to one of the manufacturers before we even started -- I didn't want to start this process unless we could ascertain that it was going to happen. That it was -- we had -- that the preponderance of the evidence yielded a likelihood that we would get the equipment in time, within the time frame. And the manufacturer, Lochinvar in this case, said yeah, normally it's a four to six week lead time for this equipment. You should be able to pull this off. We confirmed that with the engineer as well.

We decided that we are going to go forward with this project. And the plumbing contractor that we're hiring here confirmed that at the bid opening, that the material's readily available. That is

always our fear, like with our projects, gee, is it going to be a 52-week lead time? No.

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So if we get this contract out to them in the next day or two, next day, whatever it takes to get it out, and we get the notice to proceed we're immediately going to -- what's going to happen is I'm -- tomorrow I'm going to call the plumber and say look, I know you don't have a contract in hand but I need you to send the submittal for all the equipment to the engineer right away so he can review them. In a week you'll have -- you know, you should have a contract back. And all of those submittals will be reviewed by the engineer.

As soon as we have the signed contract in hand, both parties, we're going to tell you I'm going to send you the notice to proceed and we're going to release -- we're going to send them the contract, release the notice to proceed, and they're going to place the order as soon as they have that contract in hand. That will, you know, result in hopefully a four-week lead time for all the equipment as it comes in. Six weeks on the outside. And start construction immediately. So I'm hoping April, mid April anyway.

Mr. Shea: Well, could you, just for the record, this is for the record, would you just tell us a little bit about -- you may recall the horror stories over the year, year and a half ago of supply chain, you know, take forever to get anything.

There's seven boilers coming in here. And what about the supply chain, is there a problem?

Mr. Goldfield: Well, that's what we asked about. Apparently this type of product by the manufacturer is available. They don't have a supply chain issue on this equipment. The valves, the pipes, the remote controls, they're telling us are available.

Mr. Shea: Right. Okay.

Mr. Goldfield: That's what -- we can only know what the industry tells us. And, for example, the electrical field, they'll be the first one to tell you yeah, that's 52 weeks out. That's 72 weeks out. It was like that for just about everything for awhile. But apparently this material, they're telling us it's available, so.

Mr. Shea: Do you recall the time when the elevators were out for 12 months?

Mr. Goldfield: Oh, yeah. Well, you know,

now it's a little bit shorter on the elevator and the 1 2 generators are a little bit shorter as well. 3 know, we can only hope.

Mr. Shea: Whatever it may be it's going to be a fascinating -- I mean, I had no knowledge until two or three months ago right down the street, that's
